

Huntsville's Own Roadrunner Always Returns Home and This Year, So Does Microwave Dave Day

Dave Gallaher, aka Microwave Dave, has been a Huntsville staple for four decades, but this musical aficionado who plays weekly at places like The Nook and The Open Bottle is far more than just a local musician. Dave has appeared with music greats including Aretha Franklin, Reba McEntire, Buddy Guy and Lynyrd Skynrd.

Dave is such a fixture in the community that, in 2015, Microwave Dave Day was created in his honor and at which Dave received a key to the city. Held at A.M. Booth's Lumberyard, the event featured multiple musical acts, including the honoree himself. Microwave Dave Day has continued annually at other Huntsville venues since as the chief fundraiser for the Microwave Dave Music Education Foundation (MDMEF) a non-profit offering music education programs in North Alabama.

This year Microwave Dave Day will return "home" to The Lumberyard, which has been undergoing renovations. The 10th Annual Microwave Dave Day will serve as the official re-opening of the space on Sunday, October 13.

Dave's desire to become a musician came as a fourth grader while watching a Dixieland Jazz band perform at his elementary school. He was instantly entranced, launching his musical journey on ukulele, ultimately learning how to play more than 10 instruments. Guitar, however, has always been his mainstay. Currently, when Dave plays solo or with a band, you'll see him performing on a variety of guitars as well as on vocals.

With the impact of that fourth-grade day, the importance of music in schools has never been far from Dave's heart. Dave has played for school children since the 1970s, while later The Nukes regularly visited classrooms throughout Madison County. He continues to perform in multiple schools every year on behalf of the MDMEF and enjoys performing for children in various libraries during the W.C. Handy Music Festival, held annually in Muscle Shoals.

Born in Chicago and growing up in Texas and Atlanta, Dave landed in Huntsville in 1982 after serving in Vietnam and at Langley Air Force Base, studying at the Berklee School of Music, and working as a musician in Florida. It was in Huntsville that Dave became "Microwave Dave" after briefly sitting in at the Kaffeeklatsch. As the band leader was wrapping up, he couldn't remember his full name and said, "That was Dave, the Microwave."

The name stuck. In 1989, after being asked if he had a band that could perform live during a WLRH pledge drive, Dave assembled friend Rick Godfrey on bass and Mike Alexander on drums and Microwave Dave & amp; The Nukes was born. The Nukes worked continuously into the pandemic years with Dave, Rick and James Irvin on drums.

Dave brings a collection of guitars to every gig, and that typically includes a cigar box guitar. He started playing in 2001, after he saw Richard Johnston win the solo act at the International Blues Challenge playing a unique cigar box guitar with a broom handle neck made by John Lowe. Dave was so intrigued that he bought his own "Lowebow," adding it to his rotation.

Shortly thereafter, Huntsville had its first Cigar Box Guitar Festival, where Dave, among others, performed at Lowe Mill. The event has had many organizers and performers over the years, but Dave has been a fixture at every event. In 2021, Jeff and Tara Mello stepped in as the Festival organizers, after purchasing The Cigar Box Guitar Store, located at Lowe Mill, from the Nickel family.

At the 20th annual Festival this past May, Dave shared the stage with Debbie Bond, "Radiator" Rick on keyboard and drummer Darrell Tibbs. The band wowed the crowd, including on "I'm a Roadrunner, Honey," The Nukes version that became a hit in Europe, resulting in the band touring Europe four times during 1996.



The Mellos have shifted the Festival's focus to showcase the wide variety of genres that can be played on cigar box guitar and to raise money for music education. This year they raised \$6,300, which was split evenly to MDMEF and Arts Huntsville's Creative Launchpad.

The 10th Annual Microwave Dave Day will be held at The Lumberyard on October 13, 3:00-9:00 pm with 50 local musicians on three stages. It continues to serve as the main fundraiser for the MDMEF to fund its Concerts in the Classroom and the Danny Hall Music Scholarship.



For Concerts in the Classroom, local musicians create lesson plans based on academic standards, and then become teachers for a day, mixing music performance with learning. Each program concludes with an open discussion, giving youngsters the opportunity to ask questions and interact individually.

The Danny Hall Music Scholarship provides one year of music lessons for aspiring young musicians. Applicants complete a form and provide one letter of recommendation to be entered into a random drawing each quarter.

The HSO At 70

For several years now, Huntsville's historic Five Points neighborhood has hosted a delightful "PorchFest" each May – homeowners lend their verandas and lawns to present live music by local artists. But did you know that this springtime showcase shares something in common with the origins of the Huntsville Symphony Orchestra in the 1950s?

Indeed, among the early organizers and members of the orchestra were rocket scientists and engineers who also happened to be talented classical musicians. They sometimes gathered on their porches to serenade our shady Southern streets with the melodies of Haydn and Mozart.

To further develop this pool of talent, the HSO was first incorporated in 1954-55 as a community orchestra founded by cellist Alvin Dreger and conductor Arthur Fraser. Its debut performance was a Christmas-themed concert presented at Huntsville High School, which remained the group's performing home for some time thereafter.

In 2024-25, the HSO celebrates seventy years of nonstop music making. Today, based in the 2,000-seat Mark C. Smith Concert Hall of the Von Braun Center, it is a fully professional ensemble under the baton of internationally acclaimed conductor and composer Gregory Vajda. While some of the musicians are locals, many regularly commute to Huntsville to perform with the orchestra – some from as far away as California and New York. Auditions for vacancies are quite competitive and are advertised nationally, drawing top-notch, conservatory-trained candidates.

The HSO offers two major concert runs each season: a Classical Series spotlighting the great masterworks, and a Pops Series which provides lighter musical entertainment across a variety of popular genres. Tickets to these performances are available by means of individual purchase as well as series subscription. There are also chamber music concerts and pop-up performances around town







throughout the season, and even a spectacular FREE Family concert each year, open to the entire community at no charge.

"There's no magic quite like the thrill of a live orchestra in concert," says Melissa Jones, "and Huntsville's hometown symphony is remarkable. More Huntsvillians should be aware of just how much this group does. It's everything from the great Beethoven symphonies and epic choral performances to music from hit movies. There is something for absolutely everyone." Jones, a Huntsville native and Monte Sano resident, is a longtime fan of the HSO and works part-time as an assistant in the orchestra's music library and production departments.

Dan Halcomb, another Huntsville native with deep roots in the area, has served as the orchestra's CEO since 2008. "The HSO thrives on the basis of a dynamic relationship with the community," he relates. "We're led by a hard-working Board of local business leaders and volunteers. We're tirelessly supported by wonderful sister organizations like the HSO Guild and the HSO Foundation, as well as private and corporate sponsors and advertisers, city, state, and federal funders, and of course thousands of concertgoing patrons. We're fortunate to be at the center of a city which cares so passionately about the arts – and the HSO is dedicated to bringing world-class music and music education not only to the concert hall stage, but to the underserved in our community."

"We're proud of our heritage and our history, but I think our seventy most promising years are ahead of us still," Halcomb adds.

I Remember Oscar Gutierrez, Owner - Bandito Burrito

Mandi Cook is a longtime Huntsville resident who discovered Bandito Burrito as a teenager. She has many fond memories of Oscar, who passed away in May of this year. As Mandi says, "Bandito Burrito has a mystique about it. Go for the food - when you get there you'll discover why you really went."

I recently sat down with Mandi to talk about the days when she spent much of her time at Bandito Burrito's former location in Hampton Cove.

How did you get involved with Bandito Burrito?

I moved to Huntsville in 1993 from a small town and was just trying to find my footing. I found that there were very few venues for young people to hang out. My parents were also pretty strict, so my options for socialization were limited. I started going to Gorin's Ice Cream Shop and J Gregory's Pizzeria to see shows.

Around that time, Bandito Burrito opened a location in Hampton Cove. I had several friends who had jobs at the original Bandito on Governor's Drive, and also went to school with several of Oscar's children.

What was it about Bandito and Oscar that kept you going back?

The appeal of Bandito Burrito for me was always the sense of community and belonging that hit you as soon as you walked through the door. Oscar fostered that sense of community and managed to bring together people from all different walks of life.

It was great to be an observer. I had friends from other schools that were in bands - Oscar let them play shows there. It allowed me to see my friends' talents, while they got to live out their dreams. Oscar encouraged them, he taught them how to be business owners and how to manage themselves in a DIY sort of way.

Oscar was a mentor to us. He would regularly dole out life advice to kids who were going through a hard time. He was a great judge of character, and gave the bands that played there a lot of leeway to be

themselves. He loved music, and let all sorts of different bands play at the restaurant. He knew his crowd, but wasn't afraid to change things up musically.

His paternal nature extended to the kids who worked and hung out at Bandito Burrito. A lot of us didn't "fit in", or were having trouble at school or home. We were like his "lost kids," and he was always there to help us along with a smile and a kindly sarcastic word, and never let us go hungry.

We were his customers, but it felt like more than that - it felt like a chosen family.

You saw The Ramones there. What was that like?

That was really special. It's one thing to see high school bands, but The Ramones were clearly different. Since I spent a lot of time there I knew that The Ramones were appearing before the news spread too much. I went with my brother, and because we knew how packed it would be we made sure that we got there early.

For those who didn't know Oscar's influence, what would you tell them?

Oscar had a larger than life persona. He could get along with anyone -- as long as they behaved themselves. He was so friendly and welcoming to everyone, but at the same time he was always keenly aware of everything going on in the restaurant. He would not tolerate any nonsense, and was very protective of the close-knit community of people that had come together at Bandito.

It's hard to explain how it felt back then, but it was almost like he could look you in the eye and see right through you --see your best self, and help you become that person. That's just the kind of guy he was. He was truly a Huntsville legend.

40th Mid-South Woodcarving Show and Competition - Nov 1st & 2nd

The North Alabama Woodcarvers Association (NAWA) was created in 1981 to have a local carving club here in Huntsville Alabama. The Club will hold the 40th Mid-South Woodcarving Show and Competition on November 1st and 2nd, again at Trinity United Methodist Church, 607 Airport Road in Huntsville, Alabama. Show hours will be from 9:00am to 4:00pm on both Friday and Saturday. The show is free to the public. Attendees will have the opportunity to meet and talk with woodcarvers, see award-winning carvings of many different types, view demonstrations from expert carvers, participate in the drawing for various tools, carved items, Christmas trees adorned with carved ornaments, and other woodcarving donations. Registration will be open for carving lessons which will begin in January 2025. At the 2023 Show in November, 39 individuals registered for classes.

Having been unavailable to have a show for four years due to COVID restrictions, the 2023 show came back strong and was a roaring success. Thirty-one booths with 26 participants displayed their handiwork of carvings, with many exhibitors offering their wares for sale. Prize carvings were proudly displayed. Fifty-three ribbons for a total monetary value of \$1,735 were awarded. Ribbons and monetary prizes were awarded for first, second and third-place winners in each twenty-six judging category in addition to Best-In-Show winners. Here are a few photos of winning carvings.

The 2024 Show and Competition will bring more carvers, real-time demonstrations of carving techniques, the opportunity to take home carving supplies, and much more. This year we expect 30 or more carvers displaying 200 or more carvings such as caricatures, animals, birds, Santas, bark houses, and other designs. There will be items for everyone, many available for purchase. Again, Bob Stadtlander Woodcarvings of Mantua, Ohio will provide vendor services.

At the show, you will have the opportunity to sign up for free carving classes which begin in January 2024. NAWA meets at The Oak Park Baptist Church on Cloys Avenue NE, Huntsville. Anyone who is interested is welcome to drop by and carve or just visit. If you are a beginner and interested in knowing more about the hobby, this is a good place for advice, assistance on a project, or just visiting with those who share similar interests. Our goal is to introduce the tools, safety, understanding of wood grain direction, and the different types of cuts used. Beginner classes are to help get you started. We use the word beginner loosely, some classes are more involved than others, but all are enjoyable and doable. Check out our website at www.nawawoodcarvers.org.

If you weren't sold on woodcarving before, you will be after you attend our show. Come on down, bring your family and friends to see all NAWA has to offer, you'll be glad you did.






Bluegrass & BBQ Festival

Ancient Tones is a traditional regional bluegrass band from this area. This band is loaded with talent. The band includes Sharon Bounds on fiddle, and has won multiple State fiddle titles in several states. On guitar and lead vocals is Adam Duke from Cullman, AL. On solo

guitar is Allen Tolbert, a recognized name among guitar flat pickers in Alabama. Rick Rorex is from Huntsville and is one of the regions finest bluegrass musicians on the mandolin. Finishing out the band is Todd Freeman from Roanoke, AL on bass and Weston Stewart, a national banjo champion, from Anderson, AL.

The Grasstronauts is a progressive bluegrass band formed of local Huntsvillians. The Grasstronauts play traditional bluegrass tunes but they also play an extensive list of more modern songs not thought of as bluegrass. The group takes a wide range of Americana, Rock and Folk Rock and converts it with conventional bluegrass instruments for a very different bluegrass sound. Some examples of artists covered are The Beatles, Coldplay, The Civil Wars, Jason Isbell, Steely Dan, Crosby, Stills and Nash and the Punch Brothers. James Parker on guitar is the lead singer, Huntsville bass icon Nick Walker on bass, Ben Davis of Tangled Strings Studios on Mandolin and vocals, Russ Holder on Dobro and Vocals and Phil Riddick on Banjo.

Jim Wood holds fifteen state championship titles on fiddle and mandolin (including five times the Tennessee State Fiddle Champion) and the Berry C. Williams Memorial Award, and he was presented the Outstanding Achievement Award by Governor Ned McWherter for his work in preserving the traditions of Tennessee. He has published nine instructional videos with Homespun Tapes (Hal Leonard) and the Murphy Method (Mel Bay) and writes a regular column for Fiddler Magazine. He and his wife Inge have over 50 titles between them and both teach and play around the area.

This festival showcases all the South Huntsville and Southside Park have to offer. Whether you are taking a stroll on the Aldridge Creek Greenway or giving your dog some exercise at the dog park, stop in and enjoy the music in the shadows of the foothills to the east. 

Hearing Health Matters: BE AWARE and BE PREPARED

Being aware means having knowledge and understanding about a situation. Awareness campaigns increase public visibility and education about problems. Knowledge empowers you to tackle the issue and be prepared to respond to it. Many public campaigns have been initiated but the two longest running campaigns have been related to fire safety and prevention. Historical events have been the impetus to prepare for and prevent future disasters.

October 8-10, 1871 The Great Chicago Fire began resulting in > 250 fatalities, left 100,000 homeless, destroyed >17,400 buildings, and burned 2000 acres of land. In commemoration of this disaster, President Woodrow Wilson issued the first National Fire Prevention Day proclamation in 1920, and since 1922, Fire Prevention Week (FPW) has been observed during the week in which October 9 falls. In 1925, President Calvin Coolidge proclaimed FPW as a national observance promoting life-saving practices and home fire safety education.

October 8-10, 1871The most devastating wildfire occurred in Northeast Wisconsin (Peshtigo Fire) claiming 1200+ lives, destroying 17 towns and 1.2 - 1.5 million acres of land. The fire was thought to have started as brush ignited while railroad workers By Anita Giles MS, CCC-A Audiologist, Physicians Hearing Center



cleared land for tracks. However, WAR was the impetus to jumpstart the Wildfire Prevention Campaign. On December 7, 1941, Pearl Harbor is attacked. Spring, 1942, a Japanese submarine fires shells at a California oil facility close to the Los Padres National Forest. The Japanese military launched 9000 Fire balloons in the jet stream to cause wildfires, with an estimated 11% reaching the U.S. between November, 1944 and April, 1945. With Fire Fighters and able-bodied men serving in the military, concern arises about the protection of our natural resources.

On August 9, 1944, the creation of Smokey Bear was authorized by the Forest Service to be the symbol for forest fire prevention. In the Spring of 1950, a 3-month-old, 5 lb. Black bear cub with burned paws and hind legs was rescued from a burning tree in the Capitan Mountains of New Mexico. He became "Smokey Bear...the living symbol of wildfire prevention and wildlife conservation". At his residence at the National Zoo in Washington, D.C., he received so many letters that he was given his own zip code (20252) in 1964 by the US Postal Service.

In the 1940's, thousands of servicemen and women returned from WWII with significant hearing deficits, impacting their ability to com-

municate. The U.S. government responded by establishing hearing rehabilitation programs to test, monitor, and treat hearing issues. The field of clinical audiology was developed to assist service members with hearing loss. October is also Audiology Awareness Month.

Your brain is designed to process alerting information from your five senses allowing you to be prepared to respond to potential danger. Of these senses, hearing is your first line of defense, on alert and guarding you 24 hours a day. There are no "earlids" to shut off the sense of hearing. What happens when your hearing diminishes? The ability to hear car horns, train signals, sirens and smoke alarms, etc. decreases. Directional information that keeps us from walking toward a dangerous situation is lost. When your brain's ability to detect potential danger and keep you safe is compromised, loss of independence results. I have heard these words many times, "I can't hear my blinker, alarm system, a knock on the door, my diabetic alert, the phone…".

Hearing loss typically develops first in the high frequency (2000 to 8000 Hertz) range of hearing. Most alerting devices (alarm clocks, smoke alarms, carbon monoxide detectors, weather monitors, etc.) signal using a high-pitch sound (usually 3100 Hz). Without hearing aids, a person with hearing loss or deafness may not be able to hear an alerting signal putting their lives at risk. Most residential fire fatalities occur between 11 PM - 7 AM. Since most people don't sleep with their hearing aids on, they are more at risk if an emergency happens.

Fire Prevention Week Theme for 2024: "Smoke alarms: Make them work for you!" $^{\text{TM}}$ "

Smoke alarms provide early warning of a fire. The best chance of escape is in the first two minutes after the alarm sounds. Will your smoke alarm alert you? Studies found that traditional alarms awaken only 56% of persons with hearing loss. Alerting devices designed for people with hearing loss are available and may use visual (flashing lights), vibrotactile (bed/pillow shakers), or auditory (louder/lower pitch) signals.

Being prepared first means a visit to an audiologist to have your hearing evaluated. With this information, you will be able to develop a safety plan and acquire appropriate devices to help you hear and keep you safe. Hearing loss is an invisible disability so a medical ID bracelet can alert first responders that you need accommodations. Keep your hearing aids and phone next to your bed for easy access. Sign up for emergency text alerts or register with a Smart 911 system. Smokey Bear would say "ONLY YOU can be prepared!".

Awareness is Key to ADHD


Attention Deficit Hyperactivity Disorder (ADHD) is a neurodevelopmental disorder that affects adults and children. Three of the most common signs of ADHD are inattention, hyperactivity, and

impulsivity. These three areas have many signs or symptoms, too, and each person, whether a child or adult, can experience one more than the other or a combination of them. For example, a child may need help staying on task at school, and an adult may find it hard to complete their work tasks if they are uninterested. It can also be challenging to get work done if you cannot seem to stay still or lack the energy to do so, all of which are signs of possible ADHD. It leaves us with the last symptom, impulsivity, which can mean anything from talking excessively and interrupting others while they are speaking to making decisions on a whim or out of a state of emotions.

Diagnosing whether a person has Attention-Deficit/Hyperactivity Disorder (ADHD) involves a multi-step process. There are tests used to help identify signs of ADHD; these tests, alongside an evaluation from the provider, can help to determine a diagnosis. As many other issues, such as anxiety and depression, can exhibit similar symptoms, a professional healthcare provider will analyze all tests during a behavioral evaluation.







These tests include a T.O.V.A (Test of Variables of Attention), a computerized assessment tool for measuring attention, response time, and movement. There are also Vanderbilt Assessment Scales, which are forms that question the patient's ability to concentrate, start and complete tasks, and their mood. These forms are given to parents and teachers to get a full picture of what is happening at school and home.

Often, for children, first-time concerns arise from their teachers when a child is unable to sit and focus or may become a distraction to others in the class with their behavior, which becomes an uncontrollable pattern. Even when the child may be trying their hardest to behave, it can be challenging to do so. The school may then suggest the child get an evaluation. For adults diagnosed with ADHD in adulthood, it's most likely they experienced symptoms as a child but were never accurately diagnosed. This condition can sometimes be mistaken as a lack of discipline, an excuse for laziness, or even bad parenting, which is all myths and reasons why an adolescent or adult could not have known their thoughts and behavior were due to the underlying issues of having ADHD.

Another area of myths and misunderstandings is the treatment for the condition. Medication is used to control the symptoms and can benefit the patients. Most medications are classified as controlled substances, and some are not, so talking to your healthcare provider on this topic is ideal. There is also going the unmedicated route, which consists of behavioral therapy, brain training, lifestyle changes, nutrition, and training for parents. Ultimately, the use of medications and therapy together is often the most effective approach. Dirty sock syndrome doesn't go away either; it can keep coming back whenever a heat pump goes through defrost. The only way to treat this permanently is with a UV light and ozone generators. I cleaned coils and had the same problem the next day.

Units also have issues with intruders such as bugs in the first days of fall. When it starts to get cold, snakes, rats, and multitudes of bugs seek to take refuge in side heating units. I have found blowers full of nuts, wasp nests in exhaust, and ants in burners. These intrusions in your heating system can cause failures and safety concerns.

One of the biggest concerns for heating technicians is carbon monoxide poisoning. The main cause for carbon monoxide poison is improper operations and holes in the heat exchanger. One of the main focuses of any heating inspection should be checking for leaks in the heat exchanger where fumes encounter the airstream from the blower and go back in your home.

Proper mix of air to gas mixture can help prevent dangerous fumes and preserve the unit. Maintenance in the fall can help you avoid break down but it can help with your health. Often CO poisoning doesn't result in death but instead causes apathy and flu like symptoms.



- · Parents and chaperones should carry flashlights, and ensure that each child is still part of your group before leaving to go to the next home! Another great suggestion are glow sticks!
- · Keep fog machines away from areas where people are walking. Visibility is important when people are walking up to your door.
